A. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The U.S. Embassy in Baghdad invites eligible organizations to submit proposals to implement a project to support and develop committed young environment champions through Ecology Action groups focused on activities in high schools in Baghdad. The program implementer will create Eco Action Clubs or related organized extra curriculum groups at their schools. The implementer will also design the curriculum and the program. The Eco Action Clubs will be supporting student and faculty input in development of ecological activities.

The opportunity will support targeted activities of the Eco Action Clubs to amplify efforts to combat climate change. The programs will serve to promote environmental diplomacy by building champions in climate advocacy for youth as well as youth leadership skills to carry out their initiatives.

The Public Affairs Section of the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad seeks proposals for a project called "Iraqi High School Eco Action Clubs." The proposed project will consist of establishing and managing Eco Action Clubs in conjunction with six high schools in Baghdad and its surrounding areas. The implementer will identify and develop 60-100 young environmental champions from these school clubs. The implementer will be responsible to the school's outreach and facilitate the Iraqi Ministry of Education required approvals.

This program will prepare high school students to advocate for environmental reform and raise awareness to protect the environment in Baghdad, the most populated city in Iraq. The program implementer will work with the participating schools to create Eco Action Clubs through volunteerism amongst high school students. The grantee will select 60-100 students targeted school-aged youth with teachers, highlighting and advocating conservation and management of the environment and climate. Specifically, the grantee will work with the participating schools, and the U.S. Embassy will approve venues.



Program Objectives:

- develop an eco-agenda and action plan to highlight and realize regional climate change solutions that engage the students.
- prepare and distribute educational materials for youth in the schools.
- teach the participants about environmental issues, local, regional, and global challenges, and best practices, and inspire them to care for the environment and become environmental stewards.
- maintain a thematic calendar and conduct workshops involving local and U.S. experts at the school venues and in the American spaces in Baghdad.
- create and carry out social media campaign, mainly Facebook and Instagram accounts.
- arrange a competitive micro grant application to support innovative Eco Action Club activities.
- facilitate the outing for Eco Action Clubs to environmentally important areas for the eco-champions with their teachers and families.
- develop, in partnership with the Eco Action Clubs, a climate change school activity curriculum focused on regional climate change solutions that will be shared with all participating schools.
- arrange for speaking roles by Embassy at the various Eco Action Clubs.
- organize a targeted Public Affairs strategic media campaign to maximize the public outreach impact of these programs including both traditional and social media, and potential Speakers.
- organize a selection process, school competition to identify six environmental champions in each participating school team toward the end of the program.

In addition, the program implementer will:

- Foster relationships between U.S. institutions working in the environmental sector and Iraqi institutions.
- Facilitate EducationUSA sessions at the 6 high school to promote for Education opportunities in the United States.
- Provide quarterly reporting and budget updates on program activities to U.S.
 Embassy Baghdad's Public Diplomacy Section.
- Serve as the primary point of contact and source of information for Iraqi institutions, and U.S. Embassy Baghdad.
- Manage all logistical elements of the program.
- Encourage volunteerism among high school students as a part of extra curriculum activities to participate in Eco Action Club program.
- Conduct two workshops with local experts, teachers for promotion of the sustainable concepts and activities (e.g., recycling, water conservation, solar energy, and air quality).



- Provide weekly lessons for the Eco Action Club members in environmental (climate change, deforestation, water consumption awareness).
- Plan activities such as plant a tree, Earth Day and Environment Day Events, field trips, seminars, visit to Al-Zawraa park.
- Design and launch logos, slogan, and social media and adhere to the branding and marking of the U.S. embassy requirements.

Participants and Audiences:

Highschool students in Baghdad area and teachers.

Support of Equity and Underserved Communities:

Proposals should clearly demonstrate how the program will support and advance equity and engage underserved communities in program administration, design, and implementation. Proposals should clearly demonstrate how classes would successfully accommodate and integrate learners with mobility impairments in all components of the Access program.

1. Eligible Applicants

The following organizations are eligible to apply:

- US and foreign Not-for-profit organizations, including think tanks and civil society/non-governmental organizations.
- Have demonstrated experience developing and administering similar programs.



• Have the capacity to operate in Iraq and have active partnerships with organization(s) operating in Iraq needed to support the program.

All Federal assistance recipients must have a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and a CCR (CAGE) number prior to funds disbursement.

2. Other Eligibility Requirements

In order to be eligible to receive an award, all organizations must have a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) number issued via www.SAM.gov as well as a valid registration on www.SAM.gov. Please see Section D.3 for more information. Individuals are not required to have a UEI or be registered in SAM.gov.

Content of Application

Please ensure:

- The proposal clearly addresses the goals and objectives of this funding opportunity
- All documents are in English
- All budgets are in U.S. dollars
- All pages are numbered
- All documents are formatted to 8 ½ x 11 paper, and
- All Microsoft Word documents are single-spaced, 12-point Calibri font, with a minimum of 1-inch margins.

The following documents are required:

- **2. Summary Page:** Cover sheet stating the applicant's name and organization, proposal date, program title, program period proposed start and end date, and brief purpose of the program.
- **3. Proposal (10 pages maximum):** The proposal should contain sufficient information that anyone not familiar with it would understand exactly what the applicant wants to do. You may use your own proposal format, but it must include all the items below.
 - Proposal Summary: Short narrative that outlines the proposed program, including program objectives and anticipated impact.
 - Introduction to the Organization or Individual applying: A description of past and present operations, showing ability to carry out the program, including information on all previous grants from the U.S. Embassy and/or U.S. government agencies.
 - **Problem Statement:** Clear, concise and well-supported statement of the problem to be addressed and why the proposed program is needed
 - **Program Goals and Objectives:** The "goals" describe what the program is intended to achieve. The "objectives" refer to the intermediate accomplishments on the way to the goals. These should be achievable and measurable.
 - **Program Activities**: Describe the program activities and how they will help achieve the objectives.
 - **Program Methods and Design**: A description of how the program is expected to work to solve the stated problem and achieve the goal. Include a logic model as appropriate.
 - **Proposed Program Schedule and Timeline:** The proposed timeline for the program activities. Include the dates, times, and locations of planned activities and events.
 - Key Personnel: Names, titles, roles and experience/qualifications of key personnel involved in the program. What proportion of their time will be used in support of this program?
 - **Program Partners:** List the names and type of involvement of key partner organizations and sub-awardees.
 - **Program Monitoring and Evaluation Plan:** This is an important part of successful grants. Throughout the timeframe of the grant, how will the activities be monitored to ensure they are happening in a timely manner, and how will the program be evaluated to make sure it is meeting the goals of the grant?
 - **Future Funding or Sustainability** Applicant's plan for continuing the program beyond the grant period, or the availability of other resources, if applicable.

- 2. Unique Entity Identifier and System for Award Management (SAM.gov)

Required Registrations:

All organizations, whether based in the United States or in another country, must have a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and an active registration with the SAM.gov. A UEI is one of the data elements mandated by Public Law 109-282, the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA), for all Federal awards.

Note: As of April 2022, a DUNS number is no longer required for federal assistance applications.

The 2 CFR 200 requires that sub-grantees obtain a UEI number. Please note the UEI for sub-grantees is not required at the time of application but will be required before an award is processed and/or directed to a sub-grantee.

Note: The process of obtaining or renewing a SAM.gov registration may take anywhere from 4-8 weeks. Please begin your registration as early as possible.

- Organizations based in the United States or that pay employees within the United States will need an Employer Identification Number (EIN) from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and a UEI number prior to registering in SAM.gov.
- Organizations based outside of the United States and that do not pay employees
 within the United States do not need an EIN from the IRS but do need a UEI number

- Please note that as of November 2022 and February 2022 respectively,

 Commercial and Government Entity (NCAGE) code or CAGE code to apply for non DoD foreign assistance funding opportunities. If an applicant organization is mid registration and wishes to remove a CAGE or NCAGE code from their SAM.gov



registration, the applicant should submit a help desk ticket ("incident") with the Federal Service Desk (FSD) online at www.fsd.gov using the following language: "I do not intend to seek financial assistance from the Department of Defense. I do not wish to obtain a CAGE or NCAGE code. I understand that I will need to submit my registration after this incident is resolved in order to have my registration activated."

Organizations based outside of the United States and that DO NOT plan to do business with the DoD should follow the below instructions:

Step 1: Proceed to SAM.gov to obtain a UEI and complete the SAM.gov registration process. SAM.gov registration must be renewed annually.

Organizations based outside of the United States and that DO plan to do business with the DoD in addition to Department of State should follow the below instructions:

Exemptions

An exemption from the UEI and sam.gov registration requirements may be permitted on a case-by-case basis if:

- An applicant's identity must be protected due to potential endangerment of their mission, their organization's status, their employees, or individuals being served by the applicant.
- For an applicant, if the Federal awarding agency makes a determination that there are
 exigent circumstances that prohibit the applicant from receiving a unique entity
 identifier and completing SAM registration prior to receiving a federal award. In these
 instances, Federal awarding agencies must require the recipient to obtain a unique
 entity identifier and complete SAM registration within 30 days of the Federal award
 date.

Organizations requesting exemption from UEI or SAM.gov requirements must email the point of contact listed in the NOFO at least two weeks prior to the deadline in the NOFO providing a justification of their request. Approval for a SAM.gov exemption must come from the warranted Grants Officer before the application can be deemed eligible for review.



3. Submission Dates and Times

Applications are due no later than **September 15,2024**.

4. Funding Restrictions

The U.S. Embassy Baghdad policy is not to award profit under assistance instruments. Pre-Award Costs – No costs chargeable to any award resulting from this NOFO may be incurred before receipt of either a fully executed Agreement or a specific, written authorization from the Grant Officer.

5. Other Submission Requirements

All application materials must be submitted by email to baghdadpdgrants@state.gov.

E. APPLICATION REVIEW INFORMATION

1. Criteria

Each application will be evaluated and rated on the basis of the evaluation criteria outlined below.

Quality and Feasibility of the Program Idea – 20 points: The program idea is well developed, with detail about how program activities will be carried out. The proposal includes a reasonable implementation timeline.

Organizational Capacity and Record on Previous Grants – 20 points: The organization has expertise in its stated field and has the internal controls in place to manage federal funds. This includes a financial management system and a bank account.

Program Planning/Ability to Achieve Objectives – 15 points: Goals and objectives are clearly stated, and program approach is likely to provide maximum impact in achieving the proposed results.

Budget – 10 points: The budget justification is detailed. Costs are reasonable in relation to the proposed activities and anticipated results. The budget is realistic, accounting for all necessary expenses to achieve proposed activities.



Monitoring and evaluation plan – 15 points: Applicant demonstrates it is able to measure program success against key indicators and provides milestones to indicate progress toward goals outlined in the proposal. The program includes output and outcome indicators and shows how and when those will be measured.

Sustainability – 10 points: Program activities will continue to have positive impact after the end of the program.

Support of Equity and Underserved Communities – 10 points: Proposals should clearly demonstrate how the program will support and advance equity and engage underserved communities in program administration, design, and implementation.

Review and Selection Process

A review committee will evaluate all eligible applications.

- 3. Responsibility/Qualification Information in SAM.gov (formerly, FAPIIS)
- i. The Federal awarding agency, prior to making a federal award with a total amount of Federal share greater than the simplified acquisition threshold, is required to review and consider any information about the applicant that is in the U.S. government designated integrity and performance system accessible through SAM.gov (see 41 U.S.C. 2313);
- ii. An applicant, at its option, may review and comment on any information about itself that a federal awarding agency previously entered. 1. Federal Award Notices

The grant award or cooperative agreement will be written, signed, awarded, and administered by the Grants Officer. The assistance award agreement is the authorizing



document, and it will be provided to the recipient for review and signature by email. The recipient may only start incurring program expenses beginning on the start date shown on the grant award document signed by the Grants Officer.

If a proposal is selected for funding, the Department of State has no obligation to provide any additional future funding. Renewal of an award to increase funding or extend the period of performance is at the discretion of the Department of State.

Issuance of this NOFO does not constitute an award commitment on the part of the U.S. government, nor does it commit the U.S. government to pay for costs incurred in the preparation and submission of proposals. Further, the U.S. government reserves the right to reject any or all proposals received.

2. Administrative and National Policy Requirements

3. Reporting

Reporting Requirements: Recipients will be required to submit financial reports and program reports. The award document will specify how often these reports must be submitted.

H. OTHER INFORMATION

Guidelines for Budget Justification

Personnel and Fringe Benefits: Describe the wages, salaries, and benefits of temporary or permanent staff who will be working directly for the applicant on the program, and the percentage of their time that will be spent on the program.

Travel: Estimate the costs of travel and per diem for this program, for program staff, consultants or speakers, and participants/beneficiaries. If the program involves international travel, include a brief statement of justification for that travel.

Equipment: Describe any machinery, furniture, or other personal property that is required for the program, which has a useful life of more than one year (or a life longer than the duration of the program), and costs at least \$5,000 per unit.

Supplies: List and describe all the items and materials, including any computer devices, that are needed for the program. If an item costs more than \$5,000 per unit, then put it in the budget under Equipment.

Contractual: Describe goods and services that the applicant plans to acquire through a contract with a vendor. Also describe any sub-awards to non-profit partners that will help carry out the program activities.

Other Direct Costs: Describe other costs directly associated with the program, which do not fit in the other categories. For example, shipping costs for materials and equipment or applicable taxes. All "Other" or "Miscellaneous" expenses must be itemized and explained.

Indirect Costs: These are costs that cannot be linked directly to the program activities, such as overhead costs needed to help keep the organization operating. If your organization has a Negotiated Indirect Cost Rate (NICRA) and includes NICRA charges in the budget, attach a copy of your latest NICRA. Organizations that have never had a NICRA may request indirect costs of 10% of modified total direct costs as defined in 2 CFR 200.68.



"Cost Sharing" refers to contributions from the organization or other entities other than the U.S. Embassy. It also includes in-kind contributions such as volunteers' time and donated venues.

Alcoholic Beverages: Please note that award funds cannot be used for alcoholic beverages.
